Different Attitude Seen at Bedford

TEMPERANCE — "The learn is starting to develop a winning attitude, and I think this is going to make a big difference."

These were the words of Ray Kwiatkowski, head football coach at Bedford High School.

"We don't have much depth, but if we stay healthy we have a good chance to win the Great Lakes League. Of course, the fact that we are a week and a half behind the Ohio schools in practice will affect us in early league play," Kwiatkowski added.

The Mules went 3-6 in 1965, Kwiatkowski's first year as coach, losing three games by seven points or less before blanking Whitmer 6-0 in the final game of the season. The Whitmer game is the one Coach Kwlatkowski believes gave the players a winning attitude and the necessary confidence.

There are 10 lettermen returning from last year's squad, all seniors. They are: Dave Long, a 5-8, 185-pound fuilback; C h r l s McMacken, 5-11, 170-pound quarterback; Roy Butler, big 6-1, 210-pound linebacker; Mike Ferguson, a 6-2, 185-pound end; Tom Johnson, 5-9, 160-pound end and defensive halfback; Pat Leonhardt, a 6-2, 190-pound tackle; Wayne Rumple, a 165-pound h a l f b a c k; Joe Urbanink, a stocky 5-8, 220-pound tackle; Bill Wingate, 175-pound end and Doug Dold, another 175-pounder who plays halfback.

Three seniors who haven't won etters, but are expected to see (lot of action this year are midle guard Dennis Hubbard, bruce Gamby and Fred Waren, halfbacks. , juniors slated for a lot of play this fail.

Quarterback McMacken, who broke his foot, has missed a week's practice and his availability is still a question mark. The team will have a scrim-

mage with Jackson tomorrow and elect a captain afterwards. Serving as assistants to Coach Kwiatkowski this year are Al Sluder and Larry Skeldon, backfield coaches; Jerry Berndt, Bill Regnier and Bob Ritz, line

TEMPERANCE — Showing the crispness so often associated with Bedford football squads of the past, the Mules of C o a c li Ray Kwiatkowski rolled up the school's highest point total in four years here last night, walloping Inkster Cherry Hill, 32-0. A quartet of Gary Sherman, Dave Long, Mike Ferguson and

Chris McMacken did all the offensive damage for the home squad,

Sherman, a junior with good moves and good balance. capped a 46-yard drive from the six for the game's first touchdown and moments later sprinted 45 yards into pay dirt.

Long, a squat, hard-running senior fullback, tallied twice on 3-yard runs, while McMacken threw a pass to Ferguson which covered 51 yards for a TD. The same pair clicked for one successful conversion and Sherman ran for another to give him a 13-point night.

The point total was the highest since a 32-8 drubbing of Saline during the 1962 campaign.

A stout defense led by Bill Wingate, Sherman, Wayne Rumple and Bruce Gamby throttled every Inkster bid, the visitors gaining fewer than 200 yards to the Mules' 377. Wingate's blocked punt set up the fourth Bedford tally.

ADRIAN-The Bedford Mules, led by their squalty fullback Dave Long, romped in a 25-7 triamph over the Adrian Maples here last night, notching their second football victory of the young season.

Long, the 5-7, 175-pounder, rambled for 204 yards on the ground to pace a Bedford at-tack which produced 229 yards rushing and 73 through the alr-ways. Long also tallied one of the four Mule touchdowns.

A rugged Bedford defense, led by Mike Ferguson, Joe Urbani-ak and Doug Dold, stopped Ad-rian's offense during the entire game. The Maples, loser for the second week to a Monroe County club, managed only 22 yards on the ground and 39 yards pass-ing with the Mule defenders bolding the home team to minus 22 yards total offense in the fi-nal two periods.

It was the third straight vic-

Thousands swarmed here last Thousands swarmed here lost night to pack the school's grid-iron facility to an overflow crowd and watched the 1966 Nule aggregation run rough-shod over Toledo Clay by a 26-7 count. It marked the fourth con-scutive victory for Coach Ray Rwintkowski's club.

Tired of seeing Bedford go down to defeat-after-defeat as in recent compaigns, supporters here are rejoicing this fall as memories flash back from more than a decade when the Mules were regarded as a supreme football power in the агса.

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Veteran rooters have to go Veteran rooters have to go back to 1958 to recall the last time Bedford won four football games in one season. The school posted a 4-4-1 record that sea-son under Coach Warren Eyler and seven straight losing cam-paigns followed. This year is different Ξ different

The school's last winning season was in 1957 when it had a 5-1 -ecord. And the last time the Mules won their first four games of a campaign was in 1955 when

they went on to a 6-3 record. Memories flosh back to the era of the Coaches Bill Early and Art Maschke when the Mules went five straight years, 1950 through 1954, with only one loss a season. Employing almost the same basic technique, this year's Bedford edition is a well-schooled crew in good funda-mentals of the contact sport and uses the slick attack to perfection.

Coach Kwiatkowski's club romped behind the running of rugged Dave Long to a 14-0 lead in the first period over Clay. They upped the margin to 20 points mioway in the second quarter and coasted in the fi-

quarter and coasted in the fi-nal two periods. The victory also was the sec-ond straight in the strong Great Lakes League — Bedford is the only Michigan member — and the first triumph over Clay af-ter circuits deforts for a ter nine straight deleats in a series which dates back to 1955. Included in those years were Clay victories of 61-6 in 1959,

Clay victorles of 61-6 in 1959, 48-8 in 1960, 34-6 in 1963 and 29-14 last year when the Eagles cap-tured the league title. "This was the best Bedford team I've ever seen," Coach Ted Federici of the losing Clay club said following the battle. "They just killed us on the line."
