

# Area High School Football Schedules

Dundee's Thomas Moshimer, whose Vikings will open the 1966 football season with an unbeaten streak of 27 games (one tie), is the dean of the Monroe area's high school coaches. He is starting his 8th year at Dundee.

All area schools began practice last Monday and will open their regular season play Sept. 16. Most schools are playing 9 games with Nov. 11 as the final weekend.

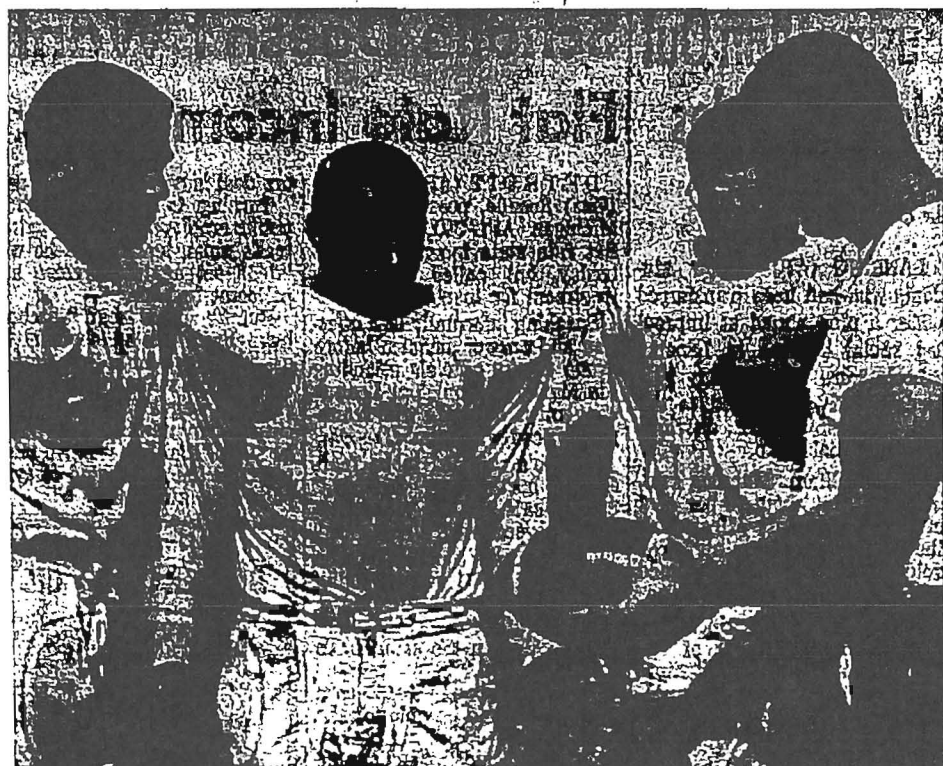

## Different Attitude Seen at Bedford

**TEMPERANCE** — "The team is starting to develop a winning attitude, and I think this is going to make a big difference."

These were the words of Ray Kwiatkowski, head football coach at Bedford High School.

"We don't have much depth, but if we stay healthy we have a good chance to win the Great Lakes League. Of course, the fact that we are a week and a half behind the Ohio schools in practice will affect us in early league play," Kwiatkowski added.

The Mules went 3-6 in 1965, Kwiatkowski's first year as coach, losing three games by seven points or less before blanking Whitmer 6-0 in the final game of the season. The Whitmer game is the one Coach Kwiatkowski believes gave the players a winning attitude and the necessary confidence.

There are 10 lettermen returning from last year's squad, all seniors. They are: Dave Long, a 5-8, 185-pound fullback; Chris McMacken, 5-11, 170-pound quarterback; Roy Butler, blg 6-1, 210-pound linebacker; Mike Ferguson, a 6-2, 185-pound end; Tom Johnson, 5-9, 160-pound end and defensive halfback; Pat Leonhardt, a 6-2, 190-pound tackle; Wayne Rumble, a 165-pound halfback; Joe Urbanik, a stocky 5-8, 220-pound tackle; Bill Wingate, 175-pound end and Doug Dold, another 175-pounder who plays halfback.

Three seniors who haven't won letters, but are expected to see a lot of action this year are middle guard Dennis Hubbard, Bruce Gamby and Fred Warren, halfbacks.

# Bedford Clouts Clay

## Overflow Crowd Watches Mule Eleven in 26-7 Win

TEMPERANCE — Bedford High School football fans are a different breed this season. And without a doubt or question—have good reason for an exuberant attitude.

Thousands swarmed here last night to pack the school's gridiron facility to an overflow crowd and watched the 1966 Mule aggregation run roughshod over Toledo Clay by a 26-7 count. It marked the fourth consecutive victory for Coach Ray Kwiatkowski's club.

Tired of seeing Bedford go down to defeat-after-defeat as in recent campaigns, supporters here are rejoicing this fall as memories flash back from more than a decade when the Mules were regarded as a supreme football power in the area.

Veteran rooters have to go back to 1958 to recall the last time Bedford won four football games in one season. The school posted a 4-1 record that season under Coach Warren Eyler and seven straight losing campaigns followed. This year is different.

The school's last winning season was in 1957 when it had a 5-1 record. And the last time the Mules won their first four games of a campaign was in 1955 when they went on to a 6-3 record.

Memories flash back to the era of the Coaches Bill Early and Art Maschke when the Mules went five straight years, 1950 through 1954, with only one loss a season. Employing almost the same basic technique, this year's Bedford edition is a well-schooled crew in good fundamentals of the contact sport and uses the slick attack to perfection.

Coach Kwiatkowski's club romped behind the running of rugged Dave Long to a 14-0 lead in the first period over Clay. They upped the margin to 20 points midway in the second quarter and coasted in the final two periods.

The victory also was the second straight in the strong Great Lakes League — Bedford is the only Michigan member — and the first triumph over Clay after nine straight defeats in a series which dates back to 1955. Included in those years were Clay victories of 61-6 in 1959, 48-8 in 1960, 34-6 in 1963 and 29-14 last year when the Eagles captured the league title.

"This was the best Bedford team I've ever seen," Coach Ted Federici of the losing Clay club said following the battle. "They just killed us on the line."

The Mules ground out 262 yards rushing and added 36 yards passing with Long, the

5-5, 180-pounder, bustling the Clay forward wall for 137 yards. "He's the greatest back I've ever seen," Coach Kwiatkowski said about his fullback. "I've never seen anyone give more than 100 per cent as he does. He went both ways for us and I'd be willing to bet he led in tackles."

Long, a senior co-captain, carried 24 times and was the workhorse of the Mule outfit. He tallied two touchdowns on a pair of short plunges and ran for one two-point conversion under the Ohio rules played in the Great Lakes League.

Gary Sherman, only a junior, lugged the pigskin when Long didn't and picked up 92 yards. Co-Captain Chris McMacken directed the attack from his quarterback spot and also tallied one touchdown.

"A real fine team effort," Coach Kwiatkowski added. "Actually our line and backfield compliment each other. These kids deserve it all and after a while you sorta get tired getting kicked in the teeth."

"They have real fine character and are just enjoying success. I'm sure they won't let it get to their heads. Of course, it's a completely different attitude everywhere here," he continued. "and the student body and fans are really behind us. That makes a difference."

Actually everything went right for the Mules. McMacken was back to pass on fourth down at the Eagle nine-yard line but couldn't find a receiver and bulled his way to the goal line with his head falling over the stripe.

Then in the second period Long lugged the oval 10 yards after Greg Davis recovered a Clay fumble. The ball squirted from the Mule fullback as he hit the five-yard mark and it rolled into the endzone where Paul Preketes, an end, fell on it after Mike Ferguson, another end, missed it.

The rugged Mule defense, led by the front wall of Ferguson, Bill Wingate, Roger Brown, Dennis Hubbard and Joe Urbanlak and backed by Long, held Clay to 99 yards on the ground. The visitors managed only four net yards in the first 19 minutes when Bedford romped to the 20-0 advantage.

"We're real proud of our defense," the Mule coach said, "but I've still got a lot of respect for Clay. They have a fine club and their boys hit hard."

"They found a weak spot on the left side of our line in the second period during that series they scored but we came up with an adjustment in the second half to cure that," he said.

Clay's only touchdown was a one-yard dive by Gary Calzone who led the Eagle runners.

It has been a long time since Bedford followers have seen the traditional "snake dance" around the gridiron after a victory as was the case last night. And an equally long time since the Mule players have had a chance to chant, with any authority, "We're No. 1" as they paraded to the bus.

It definitely is a proud and happy community so far this season.

TOLEDO — The bubble broke for the Bedford Mules here last night with Toledo Rogers turning loose Dan Houston in the final period and gaining a 22-13 triumph. It snapped a four-game winning streak for the Mules.

Houston, a 203-pound half-back, rambled for touchdown

runs of 65 and 12 yards in the final stanza last night and also scored a pair of two-point conversions for a 16-point fourth period for the home team.

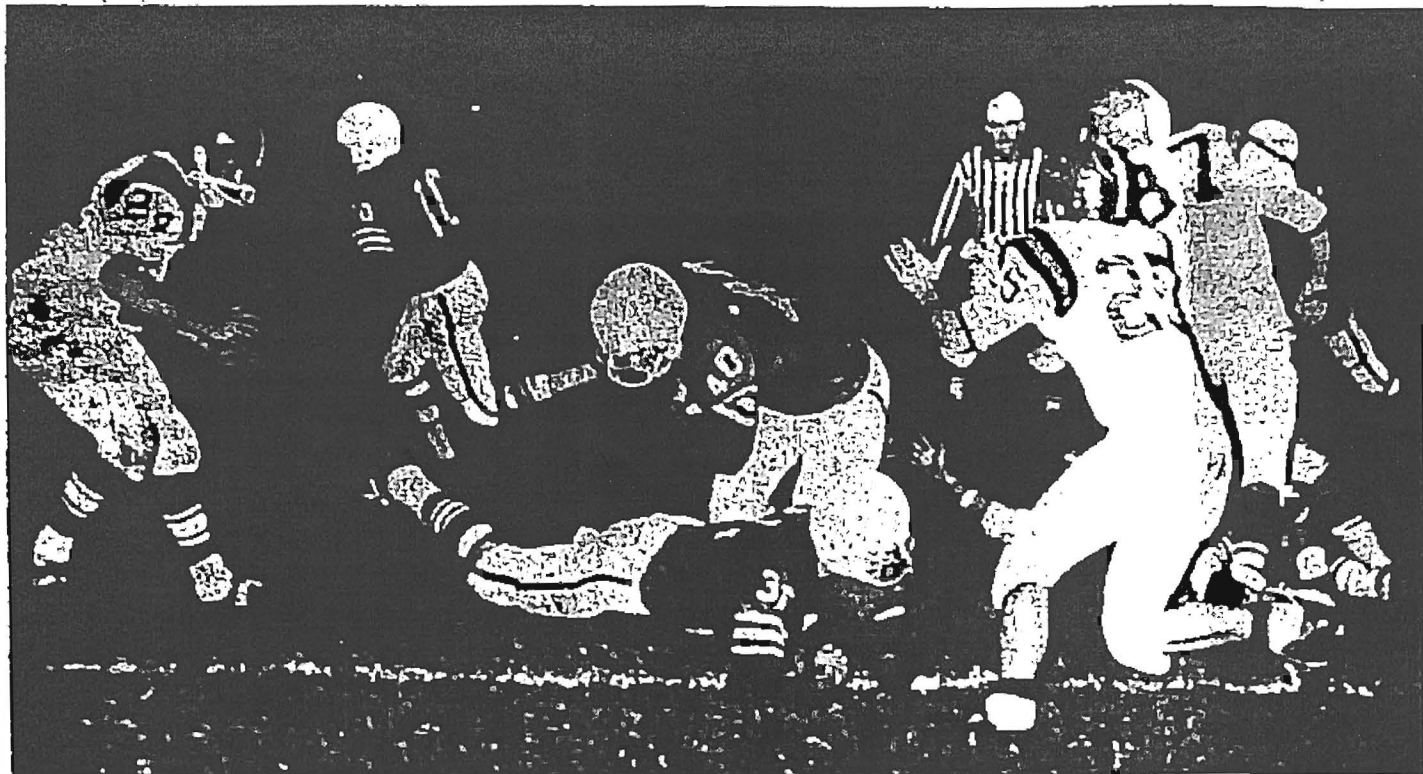

**TEMPERANCE** —The Bedford Mules, playing their finest game of the year, rolled over Port Clinton 48-14 in a Great Lakes League contest last night to assure Coach Ray Kwiatkowski a winning season. Bedford has a 5-1 record with three games to play.  
 Kwiatkowski, who compiled a 3-6 mark at Bedford last year in his first season, has brought the Mules their first winning campaign since 1957. The Mules were 5-4 that year under Warren Eyer.

"I think the whole thing started with the Whitmer game last year," Kwiatkowski said. "That game gave us a winning attitude that carried right through the winter. Our boys know they can win now and really have the confidence."
